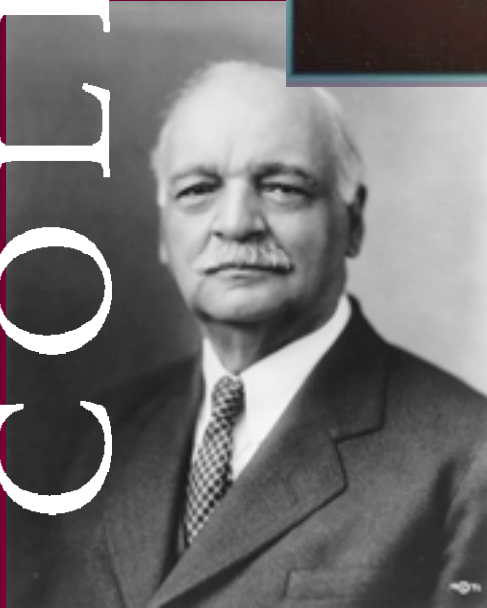




Native American Heritage Month 2008

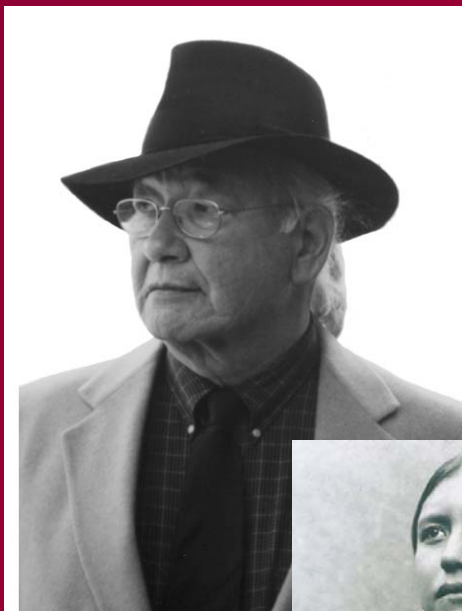
Native American Heritage Month Convocation
