

"A thing is right when it serves to preserve the integrity and stability of a biotic community, and it is wrong when it tends otherwise," said Aldo Leopold, early 20th century American ecologist, well known for his innovative "land ethic." Bret Rappaport, a leader in the Natural Landscape Movement, couldn't agree more. In his talk "Of Axes & Shovels, Boxes & Circles," Bret will speak about the "lawn ethic"—the



modern notion of monotonous "blandscapes" that yield acre after acre of barren and lifeless turf. At its heart, the land ethic vs. the lawn ethic is a fundamental struggle between preservation and destruction. The "land ethic" represents people who "carry the shovel"; the "lawn ethic" people who "carry the axe." Bret believes all of us must be "shovel carriers," and he will give tips on how to achieve this. Bret is past national president of Wild Ones—Natural Landscapers, Ltd., and is a partner with the Chicago law firm of Hardt Stern & Kayne. He is a nationally recognized authority of municipal regulations affecting natural landscapers.

Our landscapes are full of opportunities to reduce our consumption of energy. Most of them involve little or no cost, and some will actually save you money. In her talk "Energy-Wise Landscape Design" Sue Reed, a landscape architect with 23 years in ecological design, will demonstrate how to design your landscape so it saves energy and contributes to a healthier environment. She will show you how



to lower your home's heating and cooling costs and minimize fuel used in landscape construction, maintenance, and every day living. She will also show you how to choose products and materials with lower embedded energy costs. In her work in eastern Massachusetts, Sue has helped hundreds of homeowners create comfortable, livable, and beautiful landscapes that save energy. She has taught twelve years as an instructor at the Conway School of Landscape Design, and her new book, "Energy-Wise Landscape Design," which was published in April, 2010 by New Society Publishers, will be for sale at the conference. Her recent article "Sustainable Landscape Design" appears in Volume II of the new Encyclopedia of Sustainability from Berkshire Publishing. Sue will be available for book signing.

If you are interested in improving the environment in your own backyard and creating a beautiful, low-maintenance landscape that you can enjoy, you will not want to miss **Larry Weaner**'s presentation. In his talk "Sustainable Residential Landscapes: Design, Planting, and Maintenance Techniques," Larry will use case studies to illustrate how natural plant communities can be used as a model to establish beautiful land-



scapes, at any scale, using native trees, shrubs, and perennials with high ecological value. Residential-scale projects will be followed in detail, from conception to full establishment, illustrating the exciting results that can be achieved when ecological restoration is combined with the visual art of landscape design. Larry is a landscape consultant, author, lecturer, and educator, and has been creating native landscapes professionally since 1977. He founded Larry Weaner Landscape Associates, a practice focused on integration of garden creation and ecological design. His gardens have been featured in numerous periodicals and are toured by many institutions.

Whether your yard is large or small, sunny or shady, perennials will add beauty and life to your landscape. In her presentation "Tips for Low-Maintenance, High Impact Perennial Gardens," **Kerry Ann Mendez**, owner of Perennially Yours in Ballston Spa, New York, will share with you how you can have a great looking, ever blooming garden using organic practices. She will convince you not to be tempted by the



first pretty flower you see, but rather to select the right plant for the right spot in your garden. She will recommend design tips, mulch, fertilizer, maintenance shortcuts and more. Kerry Ann is a garden consultant, designer, writer, teacher, and lecturer, and has been in many national magazines including *Fine Gardening, Garden Gate*, and *Homes and Gardens*. In July, 2010, she was one of four panelists on world famous Adrian Bloom's European Press Day in England. Her book, *The Ultimate Flower Gardener's Top Ten Lists*, was released in March 2010, and will be for sale at the conference. Kerry Ann will be available for book signing.

DIRECTIONS

FROM I-95 NORTHBOUND: Exit 83, left at light at end of ramp onto Williams Street. Right onto Route 32 North at first traffic light. Left into the college main entrance at second traffic light.

FROM I-95 SOUTHBOUND: Exit 84N at end of Goldstar Bridge (over Thames River) which becomes Route 32 North. Turn left at second traffic light into main college entrance.

FROM I-395 SOUTHBOUND: Left Exit 78 onto connector to Route 32 South. College entrance about 2.5 miles south. Right at traffic light into main college entrance.
