Andrea E. Chapdelaine

President, Connecticut College

Andrea E. Chapdelaine became Connecticut College's 12th president on July 1, 2024, following a unanimous appointment by the Board of Trustees. With more than 30 years of experience in higher education, she is a strategic and inclusive leader committed to academic excellence, student-centeredness and community-building in service to the College's mission. She is a passionate advocate for providing a personalized, purposeful and integrative education that shapes confident global citizens of character, intellect and action. Since arriving on campus, Chapdelaine has focused on meaningful engagement with the entire Connecticut College community, transparent communication, and strengthening shared governance in order to develop a unified vision that will ensure continued excellence and long-term institutional strength and sustainability.

Chapdelaine previously served as president of Hood College, where she led two strategic planning initiatives, expanded academic programs, increased enrollment and retention, and oversaw exponential growth in the College's endowment. In recognition of her contributions to Hood, a scholarship for first-generation students was established in her honor. In 2019, Chapdelaine was named one of The Daily Record's 2019 Top 100 Women in Maryland and was appointed to the Governor's Workforce Development Board, in recognition of her work building partnerships to provide

experiential learning opportunities for students and to benefit the public good.

Chapdelaine's deep belief in the critical role of independent colleges and the liberal arts is reflected in her national leadership. She serves on the boards of the American Association of Colleges and Universities and the Council of Independent Colleges, and previously served on the board of the National Association of Independent Colleges and Universities. She currently serves as a member of a national task force focused on developing strategies to ensure the long-term financial sustainability of private higher education.

A proud first-generation college graduate, Chapdelaine holds a bachelor's degree in psychology and justice studies from the University of New Hampshire and master's and doctoral degrees in social psychology from the University of Connecticut. She has served five private liberal arts colleges, beginning as a faculty member at Wabash College in Crawfordsville, Indiana; Trinity College in Hartford, Connecticut; and Albright College in Reading, Pennsylvania. She also served as dean of undergraduate studies and provost at Albright. Her scholarly work has focused on faculty support, the role of undergraduate research in student learning, ethical issues in community-based learning, and procedural justice.

Chip Clothier joined the Connecticut College Board of Trustees upon his appointment as President of the Alumni Association Board of Directors on July 1, 2022. Chip is managing partner and co-founder of HFC Executive Search where he has focused on filling senior level positions for privately-held and Fortune 1000 companies for more than 15 years. Prior to joining HFC Executive Search, he spent 20 years in a variety of sales and marketing positions in the consumer and B2B industries, in particular with Nabisco and ShareMax. Before attending business school, Chip spent five years in merchandising management for Filene's in Boston, MA and Strawbridge's in Philadelphia, PA. He has received numerous awards including the American Marketing Association's prestigious EDISON Award, Advertising's EFFIE Award and Point-of-Purchase Advertising International's Gold Award. He also has been quoted in publications including The Wall Street Journal, The Philadelphia Inquirer, Ad Age, Brandweek and CFO Magazine.

Chip majored in History at Conn and earned an MBA from the Kellogg Graduate School of Management at Northwestern University in 1986. At Connecticut College, Chip served as the Student Government Association parliamentarian, senior class president and was a recipient of the Anna Lord Strauss Medal. Since graduation, he has served as alumni class president, class gift officer and has hosted frequent College events in the Philadelphia area. He is the chair of the nominating committee of the Merion Cricket Club and former chair and board member of the Agnes Irwin School in Bryn Mawr, PA.

A Short History of Connecticut College

The College was founded in 1911, but its history began in 1909 when Wesleyan University announced that it would no longer offer admission to women. At that time, more women than ever were seeking higher education and demanding the right to vote. A committee was formed and towns across the state of Connecticut began offering prospective sites.

A New London hilltop, later described as "the finest college site in the world," was the committee's first choice, and they asked New London to raise \$100,000 to ensure that their proposal would succeed. A 10-day fundraising campaign exceeded the goal by \$35,000. Nearly a third of the inhabitants of the city and the surrounding communities contributed, including many children, along with virtually every business and organization.

A board of incorporators petitioned the State of Connecticut for a charter, which was granted in April 1911. The incorporators became the board of trustees, whose first responsibilities were to appoint a president and a campus architect. As it prepared to make these decisions, the board learned with some astonishment that its chairman, Morton Plant, was giving \$1 million for an endowment. The future of the College was assured.



When Connecticut College welcomed its first students in the fall of 1915, it became the only baccalaureate institution in the State of Connecticut chartered solely for the purpose of providing higher education for women. From the beginning, the vision was for a different kind of institution and a different kind of education. The founders believed it was their duty

to create new opportunities for what the Progressive Era called the "New Woman," and so the curriculum was appropriately progressive, designed to advance students both academically and professionally. One of the College's earliest catalogues announced the young institution as "an academic and technical college," promising a modern program that combined the "universal elements in a liberal education" with in depth study of an "important branch of knowledge."

Connecticut College embraced co-education in 1969, fifty years after its first commencement, but it never forgot the pragmatism of the original educational vision. The most recent articulation of the College's mission, adopted in 2004, makes this continuity clear, with its straightforward emphasis on active citizenship: "Connecticut College educates students to put the liberal arts into action as citizens of a global society." With the celebration of the anniversary of its 100th commencement in 2019, a set of values upholding the importance of academic excellence, equity, integrity, holistic education, civic responsibility, and environmental stewardship shape the educational context that supports the College's mission today.

Today, Connecticut College is a thriving private, coeducational liberal arts institution known for developing extraordinary students who are drawn here by rigorous, interdisciplinary academics and an integrative residential life program, as well as by diverse opportunities to explore their interests through funded internships, community outreach and international study.
