~ Talk by historian Catherine 'Imaikalani Ulep is Kanaka 'Ōiwi.

Maka'āinana wāhine (commoner women) undressed to promote a sex-for-goods trade with Euro-American sailors. This talk explores Hawaiian-language texts to show sexual practices are why this trade was accepted and facilitated women's accrual of foreign cloth which challenged existing power dynamics.
